Watth The life of a congregation is a rich community tapestry of people, programs, ministries and worship. We lift up the patterns of this tapestry at Unity Church with the threads of monthly themes woven through our worship and programming. These themes deepen our understanding of our own faith and strengthen our bonds with one another in religious community. We explore each theme in worship and in our newsletter; in covenant groups, guided writing sessions and Wednesday evening programming; and in our community outreach ministries, our literary journal and programs, and many other opportunities. The December theme is Waiting.

Waiting has, perhaps justifiably, been given a bad rap. It conjures up time wasted in waiting rooms with dog-eared magazines, in traffic jams where the air is choked by exhaust, or in long lines as we queue up to claim some new possession or experience.

But wait. What about the kind of waiting that is less about taking our turn than it is about taking our time and less about arrival than it is about awareness? It is this waiting – the quiet, patient kind that turns our hurried world on its head – that calls for our attention in the cold and darkening days of December.

A few years ago, a young freelancer wrote an article about illegal Central American immigrants hopping freight trains in Mexico to reach and cross the U.S. border. When a picture editor told the journalist her story needed a dramatic photo, she headed to a Mexican train yard with her camera to hop a boxcar with the immigrants.

For seven days she waited for the right train and the right moment. Some of the trains moved too fast, others were too empty. Some weren't headed to the border; others moved through in the middle of the night. For a week she waited, passing the time by photographing the immigrants waiting with her. Only at the end of the week did she realize she had all the photographs the story needed - not images of the heart-stopping leap onto the train nor of the clattering journey down the tracks, but images of the immigrants' long, hot and hungry, often dangerous wait in the train yard.

Waiting can be as difficult to practice as it is to photograph, but it has as much to do with going someplace new as it has to do with sitting still. We might dismiss it as an annoyance, a petty passivity or undesired delay. But waiting is about preparing ourselves for something different. Waiting is about learning to see and listen so attentively that we will know when something fresh and providential comes along.

It can be challenging to experience this kind of waiting when we know how the season's stories all turn out. We already know not only who is about to born but also when and where. We already know that though the Maccabees had only one day's oil, it would burn for the

requisite eight-day watch. And certainly we know that the longest night, on winter solstice, will inevitably be followed by longer days to come.

And yet, for all our knowing, the invitation of this season and its stories is to enter a deeper kind of waiting – to wait without knowing exactly what we're waiting for. It is a kind of faithful listening, an attentiveness to possibilities we may not even yet imagine. Surely, for all our knowing, the world still contains enough mystery, enough uncertainty, enough proleptic promise that we too in the 21st century can take up this kind of faithful watch.

Can you hear the child's quiet voice of hope born outside the inn? Can you see a guiding star in the night sky or hear the host of voices singing praise for a new day and a new order? Can you light the lamp of your faith even though you fear it will run dry before your watch is through?

This is the waiting we are called into as people of faith. This is the waiting that is required not only in this season but also as we work year round for justice, as we hope tirelessly for peace, and as we live day by day into the promise of beloved community.

"[T]he work of peace and justice, like the work of the Seed within, is one of patient waiting," says Quaker Douglas Gwyn. "Patience is an active condition of the spirit. It can march; it can demonstrate; it can live in jails. It can survive the long haul of transformation."

So we are called to wait and to watch on our feet, in the long haul of transformation.

## **Just Words**

It can be so difficult to take time to just be, to wait for some "moment" to emerge. Harry Schofield, a colleague and a teacher, spent every morning waiting for the dawn. He woke in the dark, dressed, and with his two journals in hand, went outside to wait for the dawn and for the words of the prophets and the poets to come to him. Harry, you see, had spent years and years in the ministry memorizing scripture and poems by heart. I can imagine Harry sitting in his Northern California patio waiting for the poets to come. As he said, sometimes the poets don't come. But he always thought the waiting worthwhile. It was his practice, this art of watchful waiting. It involved opening the heart, eyes and ears. It involved listening within and without and noticing. In this practice of waiting, he watched the seasons go by, trees grow into maturity and old age. He lost his beloved first wife and grieved for her. Years later, he found love again and waited until his intended was convinced and agreed to marry him.

In this season of so much busyness, of doing and celebrating, it can be difficult to reach for the gifts of the spirit, which always involve waiting.

I think of waiting for babies to be born, or babies to arrive via airplanes and adoption agencies. I think of waiting for loved ones to pass over from this life to the next. I think of waiting for new life, I think of waiting for the contemplated changes to the building to take place. I think of waiting for a poem to take root in my life.

During a lectio divina session we sat in a small circle in the chapel. After some silence, a poem was read. Silence again. The poem was read again by a different person. It hardly seemed like the same poem. I heard completely different things with the different reading. Again, the poem was read. Again the poem was read by a different reader. Again, a line emerged that had flowed by unnoticed in the first two readings. I wrote about the line, letting it travel deeper into my thoughts and feelings. I sat, imagining the line coming to life, imagining what meaning and purpose it might have in my life. I left the small lectio divina session calmer, more connected to myself and those around me.

May we wait for the important but intangible things of this season with clarity and intention. And may the waiting in turn produce fruits of—and for—the spirit.

## **Offering Recipients**

## **December 4: Open Access Connections**

Open Access Connections (formerly Twin Cities Voice Mail) was founded in 1994 so that low income people in the Twin Cities could have free access to voice mail that would lead to increased self-sufficiency. Under the new name, the organization has expanded to serve all of Minnesota and is going beyond simply voice mail to make sure low income people have equal access to other technologies such as computers, cell phones, the internet, etc. Today, 350 agencies across the state partner with Open Access Connections to allow nearly 5,000 individual and families each year to have a safe and secure place to receive messages from employers, landlords, children's schools, doctors, social service providers, family members, and friends.

## **December 11: Project Excel**

Project Excel is a youth tutoring and enrichment program focused on the long-term academic success of youth in underresourced areas of New Orleans. Through collaborative outreach with local schools, organizations and community members, the program provides holistic educational support to youth. In addition to providing tutoring services, Project Excel offers year-round enrichment and leadership classes, including Audio Production, Hip Hop Poetry, Video Production, Graphic Novel Writing, Theater, Dance and Youth Advocates Program. Project Excel was founded by Unity Member Ethan Seabury-Kolod.

#### **December 18: Heart of the Beast**

The Heart of the Beast Puppet Theatre provides community theatre, produces original plays and commissioned spectacles, and teaches workshops in mask making and peacemaking throughout the Twin Cities area. This year marks the 35th anniversary of their beloved annual Minneapolis May Day Parade in Powderhorn Park. Many Unity Church children and adults have participated in performances, puppet making workshops and the parade.

## **December 25: Greater Minneapolis Crisis Nursery**

The greater Minneapolis Crisis Nursery works in partnership with parents in crisis and the community to strengthen families and prevent child abuse and neglect.

## From Craig Allen, Trustee

One Saturday morning this past month saw our busy building hosting the members of the Interfaith Youth Leadership Coalition. This organization of young people, 14- to 18-year-olds with Christian, Jewish, Islamic, Hindu, Baha'i, and secular perspectives from across the metro area, meet regularly and have it as their mission to foster interfaith understanding, reduce prejudice, and act together on common values through service and justice for the good of the world. Among other activities, they sponsor and coordinate the Interfaith Youth Day of Service on Presidents' Day every year which attracts participation from hundreds of Twin Cities young people.

Among the expressed purposes of this particular meeting, an overnight retreat, was to share experiences and learn how to advocate for a multi-faith world. But I think an unstated purpose was for each member of the group to learn how to honor implicit promises between themselves and stay in covenant with one another. The goal, at least in part, had to be to inspire trust among members so as to be able to sustain the planning and work that needs to be done in the coming months. Or it might be said that these young people were learning to see beyond the religious faith of each member to the good faith of all members.

Here at Unity Church we too, of course, have made many similar agreements with one another, both explicit and tacit. Perhaps our most widely shared covenant is that between members—we agree to look beyond our differences of opinion, to credit every person with the motivation of seeking the common good, and to continue to work and worship together. Additionally the members of the Board, when elected, covenant with the congregation to align budget, policy, and planning decisions with the mission and ends statements of the church according to the best understanding of each Trustee. I can only speak for myself, but I am sure I am not alone, when I say that I feel the force of that commitment when I am engaged in any Board activity. It is through such mutual commitment that we will continue building Unity's future.

# Uncommon Conversations I'm interested in the ethic



I'm interested in the ethics of the professional sports industry—the economic questions around stadium subsidies, the inherent gender inequalities of the major leagues, the dynamics of race, and the violence of football and the related health problems of players. I'm also well aware

of the family traditions, feelings of community and identity, and general good times that make spectator sports so popular.

There's plenty of material in there for a rich conversation about values, meaning-making, beliefs, and justice. So I started just such a conversation—on Facebook.

Those of you familiar with Facebook know that it doesn't always seem like the best venue for reflection, what with all the party photos and the often mundane personal updates. But when I posted a few thoughts about pro sports during this, the holiday/ football season, I was delighted and enlightened by the result. Within a few hours, my cousin in Milwaukee, my friend who lives in Italy, a former journalist who owns a chocolate shop, and a Vikings fan I know from Camp Unistar were among those who posted thoughtful, respectful responses to my original comment and to each other. Such a conversation was unimaginable twenty years ago, and it highlighted one of the many ways we can be enriched by listening to others.

For me, going online is no substitute for going to church, and the Internet can isolate individuals just as easily as it can connect them. But if we're careful and creative and covenantal, we can find ways to convert some of that time that so many of us spend in front of the computer into exchanges and insights we might not otherwise be able to have.





## Winter Solstice Reflection

Winter Solstice occurs this year on December 21, at 11:30 p.m., CT. This is the first day of winter—the shortest day and longest night of the year. Every day thereafter, the days grow longer until Summer Solstice, when we have the longest day and the shortest night.

Wintertime is the season of rest and renewal for the natural world. Plants stop growing and return to the earth, focusing their energy in their roots or in seed that lies dormant until Spring. Most animals that don't migrate find comfort in shelter or hibernate until warmer weather. For us, as humans, it can also be a time of rest, a time of going inward to nourish our souls, a time of re-creation. However, as we head inside for the cold Minnesota winter, it's often the opposite—we find more and more to do. Not only are the holidays coming, but everything that was set aside over the summer and fall now captivates our attention.

The part of us that is in touch with the turning of the seasons yearns for this time of turning inward to nourish our roots, this time of rest. What would it mean to spend time in the darkness waiting and ready for the unknown, quiet and attentive to the unknown? What if we didn't immediately turn to our to-do lists whenever we had a free moment, thus filling up our time with the known? What if we stopped for a moment to take in the darkening, to rest more, to respond to the invitation to slow down and nourish our souls? How might our lives be different?

Here's a starting place for a journal exploration, or a short ritual alone or with friends:

- 1. Begin in the dark, sitting in silence for a time, breathing in the darkness and the stillness.
- 2. As you sit with yourself, notice your body and feelings. What arises in you? How is it to sit here quietly with nothing to do?
- 3. When you are ready, light a single candle.
- 4. Notice if there is a change in you with this light—keep coming back to your body and heart.
- 5. Name out loud or in your journal what the darkness and stillness is calling forth in you. You may want to follow your body's impulse to move or sound this experience.
- 6. Acknowledge your gratefulness for this inward time of re-creation, and blow out the candle.

# A Ministry of Words: Within, Among and Beyond From Consulting Literary Minister Karen Hering

Three years ago, when I arrived at Unity Church to begin a new ministry of poetry, story and words, none of us knew what that might actually look like. We wanted to explore the power of words for deepening faith and building community. We wanted to engage writing as a spiritual practice and a tool for social action. We hoped to increase our fluency in the languages of faith.

With modest financial support from the Fund for Unitarian Universalism and individual donations, and with the considerable literary talent and interest here at Unity Church, together we developed a new form of ministry. We created opportunities for weaving words and writing into the life of the congregation. Some of the words came from writers long ago and far away. Some came from me. But *most* of the words were yours. And all sprang from our human search for meaning, for love and connection, for faithful living; and together they made for a rich and salient conversation.


The funding that has supported my work here in the congregation has now ended, but the conversation we have begun will continue. I will take the Open Page writing sessions to other congregations, community settings and retreats. In 2012, I will serve as writer in residence at Wisdom Ways Center for Spirituality, developing additional invitations for engaging writing as a spiritual practice and a tool for social action. And I will be completing a book about writing as a doorway to faithful living, hoping to reach an even broader audience.

As the next stage of my ministry now stretches beyond this congregation, I value and will depend on its enduring taproot here – a root that has fed it and will continue to steady its growth into the wider community.

The Greek poet Yannis Ritsos once wrote:

Every word is a doorway to a meeting, one often cancelled, and that's when a word is true – when it insists on the meeting.

Here at Unity Church, I want to thank you for passing through the doorway with me to join this meeting between words and faithful community. With curiosity and wonder, I now eagerly wait to discover how the meeting will be enlarged yet again as the words insistently lead us beyond.



## **Defeat the Minnesota Marriage Amendment at Unity Church**

The Unity Church organizing efforts to defeat the Minnesota Marriage Amendment in 2012 is off and running. Over 60 people attended two information meetings at Unity in June and October to learn about the larger organizing efforts of "OutFront" and "Minnesota United for All Families." Subsequently, seven Unity Church committees have formed to work on defeating the amendment throughout this next year. These committees are:

## Marriage Amendment Campaign

#### From Jane Bacon, UUs Out For Marriage

Will this amendment allow same-sex couples to marry? No.

Currently MN state law (517.01) defines marriage as "a civil contract between a man and a woman..." In other words, same-sex marriage is **currently prohibited** under state law. Whether or not the amendment passes, same-sex marriage will still not be allowed.

So what difference does it make if the amendment passes or fails? There will be no immediate impact because same-sex marriage will remain illegal either way. But...

- Currently this prohibition is by state statute and could be changed with a change in the legislature. A single election could mean marriage equality for same-sex couples.
- If this amendment passes, the prohibition of same-sex marriage will be written into the constitution. To achieve marriage equality would then involve: passage of an amendment to repeal the ban on same-sex marriage, and changing current state law. Eliminating an amendment is much more difficult than simply changing a law. That's why opponents of marriage equality want this amendment to be in the Minnesota constitution.

We need to understand the issue clearly and be able to explain it to others; to tell them why it's so important to **VOTE NO**. People may ask what the proposed amendment says. Here it is:

Title: "Recognition of Marriage Solely Between One Man and One Woman"

**Question:** "Shall the Minnesota Constitution be amended to provide that only a union of one man and one woman shall be valid or recognized as a marriage in Minnesota?" \( \sqrt{"Yes"} \sqrt{"No"} \)

## **Music Notes**

#### From Ruth Palmer, Director of Music Ministry

Still, still, still
The angels make music so sweet.
Sleep, sleep, sleep
My dear little child, sleep. — traditional



The words to this Austrian carol truly echo our desire for moments of peace and quiet through this often over-energized season. It is often through music that we can find these times of reflection. The very nature of extended time in sound, of words drawn into the filling of seconds, suspended in a time frame that far surpasses the normal length of speech gives opportunity for this pause — this inner tuning of self. Below I share one of my favorite passages from *Free Play: The Power of Improvisation in Life and the Arts* by Stephen Nachmanovitch:

In tuning an instrument we are forced to obliterate outside noises and distractions: As the sound gets closer and closer to the pure vibration we are trying for, as the pitch moves up and down over a smaller and smaller range, we find body and mind progressively dropping away. We enter more and more deeply into the sound. We enter into a kind of trance state. This intensified listening is deep play — total immersion in the game. And once we pick up that instrument to play, our friends the audience will enter into a similar state of mind more readily in proportion to the care we have given to that process of tuning. What we discover, mysteriously, is that in tuning the instrument we tune the spirit.

#### **Tiny Compositions**

Recent paintings by Ellen Thomson

Many of my paintings have been influenced by trips to Iceland but also imagery from my surroundings and my childhood. Whether intentional or not I'm collecting a visual vocabulary that appeals to my subconscience and any narrative found is intentionally loose and open-ended.

Waterfall, ladders, clouds, volcanoes, and horses are a few of the images that show up repeatedly. More recently I've added tornadoes, apples, birds and swingsets. I let the painting guide me while adding/layering/ subtracting these ideas constantly fighting the urge to do the predictable. My favorite part of the process is the final addition of subtle lines layered over the sometimes abstract, uncontrolled backdrops. The tactile experience of drawing brings the control back to a simple lead pencil.
